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
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
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

All these achievements were made despite two lockdowns, clubs having to adjust to online meetings, sometimes even going hybrid. Everest Toastmasters Club was the first in Nepal to start hybrid meetings, which was going on successfully. I am sure in the days to come clubs will slowly revert to hybrid meetings and eventually a fully physical meeting. Some clubs have thrived in the online setup during lockdowns. I foresee that these clubs will continue their online meetings either fully or go hybrid. It's all about learning life skills in the guise of learning public speaking and leadership skills, the medium is not going to be a hindrance. During this year, we were successful in reviving Prabhu Bank Toastmasters Club and NAMI Toastmasters Club, which were on the brink of non-renewal.

Congratulations to the Area Directors, Division and Area Council members, Division mentors, club presidents and the executive committee, and all the members.

# JAWALAKHEL GROUP OF INDUSTRIES <u>OASTMASTERS</u> BOUNCING BACK BETT

As a corporate organization that sets peoples' development as one of its key priorities, the lookout for tools and mediums for personal development and enhancement of soft skills has always been a challenge. Toastmasters was unheard of until Distinguished Members from various Toastmasters clubs approached Jawalakhel Group of Industries and took out their valuable time to give us a taste of how it works and how it would be a great means for personal development. Our club, Jawalakhel Group of Industries (JGI) Toastmasters Club (Club Number: 07683705) was chartered in December 2019, under the presidency of Toastmaster Rikesh Maharjan. Since then, JGI has observed Toastmasters as a key medium for both personal development of its employees through various avenues of Toastmasters' pathways as well as a platform for its employees to take up leadership roles - inside and outside the club.

We started our club with 25 members with much exuberance and fanfare. But as members started finding it difficult to manage time from their busy after office-hour schedules, we were reduced to half of the original charter members within a year. Also, due to the unforeseen Covid-19 circumstances, our Toastmasters meetings became inconsistent - both in frequency as well as in no. of attendees - leading to a lack of interest from existing members, too. # FELLOW TOASTMASTER: OASTMASTERS MEET

Good writers write the story of their own life, great writers write the story of others' lives. This is the story of my fellow toastmasters.

That's me trying to be sassy. How about exploring the narcissist side of me?

Being an extreme introvert (Not just an introvert but an extreme introvert), I was reluctant to talk to people. In fact, I still am. I always used to find ways to shy away from people. As Tyler The Creator said, "Exactly what you run from, you end up chasing", my goal for life had to do a lot with people.

I don't know how the dots connected but the end result was that now I belong to this amazing fraternity of Toastmasters. Let me remind you again, this is the story of my fellow Toastmaster. I was so impressed to see people synergizing every week for 1.5 hours, and in that process improving themselves and contributing towards the progress of their fellow toastmasters. The beauty of Toastmasters' meeting is that different people take up different roles and learn something new at each meeting.

Allow me to write about some of the roles of Toastmasters meetings.

With due respect to all the roles, I'm just writing about the indirect evaluators and ballot counter here.

Tip of the iceberg. A timekeeper who tracks and records the time.

But if we dig deep, a timer is the one who can dictate the pace of the whole meeting and create a culture of speaking within a time limit. No matter how good of a speaker you are, if you speak over an allocated time, you won't provide value via your speech. You can take the example of your teacher not leaving the class after the bell. You disliked those teachers for that, right? And if it was an off period or a recess, the dislike must have gone even higher. The timer literally saves the speakers from being that teacher.

#### Ah-counter:

This was the role I found the most interesting. Calculating the numbers of 'ahs' in a speech was something I had never thought or heard of. It may sound simple and insignificant but it helps speakers to eliminate those disrupting sounds. This helps them work on their fluency and move towards transforming themselves into proficient speakers.

Grammarian:

According to millennial and Gen-Z terms, Grammarian can also be called a Grammar Nazi.

Since we all used to have a whole book regarding Grammar during our school days, I believe we already know how important this role is. One interesting thing about the Grammarian is that, they help us widen our vocabulary by providing a word (referred as Word of the day) in every meeting.

#### Vote Counter:

If I guide others to the treasure I can't possess it. I have never seen the vote counter winning any awards but they present the awards to all the winners and encourage them to keep up the good work.

If you're someone who can't talk in front of people, these are the roles which I feel can work as a great confidence booster as there's less talking involved with them and the gratification after you successfully complete any role is immense. You've provided value to someone and received a larger amount of value as a return for yourself.

If you are wondering, what's the greatest thing about all the roles and a Toastmasters meeting?

They are all strategically placed to develop communication, leadership, and public speaking skills.

All the roles emphasize listening (not just listening, but empathic listening) more than speaking. Communication is all about comprehension. If you're not comprehending, that's not communication.

The more you listen, the more you comprehend. And then there's a speaker who communicates what he/she has comprehended. Let me remind you for one last time, this is the story of my friend. (That's just me trying to be sarcastic and prove myself a great writer.)



But for me, Toastmasters has been something that I walked into without knowing what I was signing up for - complaining halfway through - which gave me the people skills that I needed. It may not be a job that pays but it is a job I do not want to give up on.

I was a student far from any leadership activities in school while growing up - a quiet person who only did her assignments as a compulsion and never spoke up. Neither could anyone imagine me in such a role nor did I think of doing anything of this sort. I don't blame them because I was THAT kid who would not do anything except assignments. I can assure you that things would be the same had the Covid-19 pandemic not happened. Had I not been elected the class representative without knowing what it entailed and had I learned to say NO, I would not have been writing this. So, for me, Toastmasters is something that happened by chance, and turns out that not being able to say NO isn't so bad after all. It is about turning the tables in your favor.

SAIM Toastmasters Club is what made me realize that having a compliant attitude, sometimes, makes things happen. It changed THAT silent kid focused on only assignments into someone who wants to do everything except assignments. I grew up from being a shy girl in the corner to the confident student at the center of the crowd leading her team with confidence.

Keeping the club going has been challenging. From not having enough members to form an executive committee, struggling to conduct regular meetings to now being a strong standing Toastmasters Club today, we have been through it all. The fact that we are still here is what makes us different at SAIM Toastmasters Club. We have been able to navigate through the recent ups and downs, collaborating with different clubs. Overcoming all the challenges, we have survived through this tough time well. Together we have helped one another achieve milestones and had fun along the way. So, here is to our new beginnings!

4. A well- knitted network of professionals and friends is one of the things you need in this dynamic world. Such networks add value to your personal and professional growth. It is about surrounding yourself with successful people who spread a positive aura and are constantly investing in themselves. So, if you do not want to be exposed to a diverse group of enthusiastic people, then you should not become a Toastmaster.

#### EXPRESSING MYSEL

Did you know that half the people you meet in your life struggle to communicate the message they want? And we could be one of them. It may be because we are unable to control our environment, express our personality, or even simple things like conveying affection to our loved ones. These might sound like petty things but trust me, they aren't. Most of the time we are scared of the judgments people will have. But I say it's so necessary to speak up. Nora Roberts says, "If you don't go after what you want, you'll never have it. If you don't ask, the answer is always no. If you don't step forward, you're always in the same place.

For sure, speaking up won't solve all your problems. Whether it is fair or not, not speaking up for yourself, is a sign of weakness and that's how people will view you. Your opinion establishes your impression and why would you let someone have an opinion about you without knowing you first. I used to be this person who would stay silent even in offensive situations. I used to stay quiet when people would blame me for things I didn't do or mistakes I didn't make. I thought I was being non-aggressive or non-violent but I was being a coward. How people viewed me mattered to me a lot. All these times, I felt like screaming at them and I felt like standing up for myself. But I simply did not dare to do so.

People would come up with their meaningless "SORRYS" and guess what I would reply with, "It's okay!" Often we hide behind a half-hearted, unreal smile and nod in agreement instead of speaking up about what we think. It is going to be difficult, no doubt. But, if you learn to express yourself, you are ready to let go of the weight from your shoulders that you've been carrying forever. People are going to call it arrogance, attitude problems, and what-not. But, you have

to call it confidence. I was the person who was not able to combat the verbal attacks, it disturbed me and got me thinking that I could have said this and that later on. I had it all in my head but I couldn't speak up. This logic applies in expressing every human emotion.

It refers to the notion that some individuals feel as if they ended up in esteemed roles and positions not because of their competencies but because of some oversight or stroke of luck. This particular situation resonates with me a lot. I have never been satisfied with myself. The triumph behind testing the waters filled with glory and achievement was in my upbringing, and learning has always been my first love. As a traveler with a camera as my companion, being locked in a room, I had to reimagine discovering beautiful destinations. I started to unfold the entire archive of my travel diaries and started to travel again and found stories worth sharing with the viewers as a visual creator.

Every day I think of narrating a voiceover on my travel videos but would take a step back - the reason is that I cringe over my recorded voice. Wait, I assume it isn't just me who flinches at the recorded voice of their own. Eventually, the day I get a hold of my confidence in my recorded voice, a new sensation is set to be born. While I have never put a confined boundary to limit my interests, is it the perfection that I have sought in everything that I do that is limiting me to get the best of myself? It could be the reason, and I expect to break the ceiling of glass to emerge as the new sensation Morgan Freeman, whom I look up to. Narrating like him is a long way to set a journey, but I firmly believe having the trait of a conquer garnishing the skills that would trigger all of those instincts and qualities of an achiever. The time I spent focusing on my breath and the unnoticed activities this human body does, helped me accelerate the process of controlling our minds. Self-esteem is congruent to the amount of time we set for ourselves, the most important thing that I figured out. The definition of happiness is abstract to the extent we bind ourselves with the pressure given to our brain. I find intrinsic happiness in honing the skills that I intend to enhance each day in a positive upward curve. We often quote, "I don't have time for myself, extreme busyness due to work," but alongside managing time for ourselves, managing energy is equally important to redirect the force that our body possesses. Cognitive restructuring is a helpful technique that I have adopted to understand unhappy feelings and moods and challenge the sometimes wrong "automatic beliefs" that can lie behind them. I practice framing the unnecessary negative thinking that we all experience from time to time to counter negative thoughts with positive statements and to come up with affirmations that neutralize those thoughts.


#### 4. KU-SOM Toastmasters Celebrates 100th Meeting




#### 5. The Journey of 3 Years at Bodhi

#### 6. 1ST ANNIVERSARY MEETING OF **ACE TOAST MASTERS CLUB**




#### 7. Leaders in the making



## THE 3M OF MENTORING: MANUAL, MENTEE & MENTOR

For about a century now, Toastmasters has been well recognized, for its education system having amazing processes that enable individuals to transform their lives by becoming effective communicators and leaders. Having lived as a dedicated Toastmaster for twenty plus years, I am happy to acknowledge the whole process as 'mentoring', which I prefer to call the 'technol-ogy' of Toastmasters. The distinct flow of processes is very well documented in the manuals of Toastmasters. Human emotions, aspirations of a mentee, and empathy of a mentor to offer support give the manual a life and the technology

works so well that it has been applied and replicated to produce desired results for the past 96 years.

The technology looks as simple as water, and yet is magical in its impact. It is a fine equilibrium in three major constituents: Manual, Mentee, and Mentor, and through mentoring operative and optimal results can be generated when these constituents are congruent, fully operative, and aligned to the same objective. Each constituent has its own dimension.

Manual: A member joining a Toastmaster club gets access to a manual. Very well crafted manuals have specific objectives of guiding a member to the desired result on completion of an activity outlined in the manual. However, a member at times skims superficially at a level of letters and misses subtle and deeper aspects of the spirit encapsulated within the letters. Therefore, the manuals require careful and deeper diving. I recall, when I joined Toastmasters in 1998, we used to have printed manuals and mentors guided us to read, reread, and highlight important portions to delve deeper. Compliant to these deeper aspects are the objectives of projects a member undertakes to complete.

Mentee: A mentee in a Toastmaster club is a seeker who comes with an aspiration to transform. There are multiple human emotions at work as one sets out for the journey. However, one has to prepare emotionally to be able to accept, assimilate, and apply the feedback one receives in the process. Each member of Toastmasters begins from 'icebreaking' and letting go of their inhibition, ego, and biases. Preparing oneself for this process is both a big challenge and a change that I have felt myself and seen others take time to acclimatize. For some, this is an easy cake while for others, a panting and perspiring moment. Yet, by few roleplays, project works, and speeches, a member sheds ego



and hesitations. Prerequisite of a mentee is humility- willingness to listen, accommodate, and apply what comes in. A Toastmaster is expected to be the most compatible member of the community and all are helped to achieve this goal gradually.

**Mentor:** A mentor in Toastmasters is someone who has earned credibility by being consistent in the discipline of taking responsibilities and has made substantial progress in transformation and scaling up in educational achievements. However, all personal achievements kept aside, a mentor has different

sets of empathy for mentees and demonstrates a keen inclination to offer support and lead people. A mentor himself/ herself is a learner, aspiring to get better in this regard by way of mentoring as a process and diligently trying to apply knowledge, skills, and experience earned.

Mentoring is an art which does not come by a casual wish but must be nurtured by a deliberate dedication following the laid process. A Toastmaster polishes this skill by adhering to discipline and applying the skills learned during the journey. Like many other skills, one must deliberate substantially to unleash mentorship. Anybody who is trained in the legacy manual of Toastmasters will acknowledge the fact that the Pathways has a better-consolidated manual of mentorship with all the details, procedures, and forms laid down. However, mentoring is a supplementary path that is offered to a member as an elective after completion of Level 2. A Toastmaster matures to the next realm once they consciously consider taking this route.

For a member of Toastmasters, mentorship is an opportunity and a responsibility blended together and offered as a privilege. Through the mentorship program, Toastmasters regenerates the technology of learning to make it ever-relevant. The mentorship is a wide sky and a mentor has a parachute having fabrics of Integrity, Respect, Service, and Excellence to navigate through; no other tool, other than the credibility of a mentor, is of use here in this space. Everyone cannot be a mentor, one has to earn it. Once you do, you are expected to demonstrate and deliver. Toastmasters has thrived so far on this commitment of members and, I believe, mentoring keeps the learning system ever afresh.

# JOURNEY OF A CHAMPION: MOHAMMED QAHTANI

How does a speaker become a Champion?

Whenever I see Champions on stage, I always wonder about every step they must have taken to reach this far. If even one thing had happened differently, would the person still be standing there as the Champion? How beautiful is it to be able to see every stroke of hard work, luck, and footsteps taken by a person by using our vivid imagination to paint their picture using the real words they speak? I have always found it beautiful to be able to trace my fingers on each one of those words and see the whole journey map out at the end; it is absolutely blissful, charming, and oh so, cathartic!

To paint this picture of the journey of one of the most acclaimed International World Champion of Public Speaking, Division N on 12th September 2020 organized a programme "Journey to the Championship" for the one and only Mohammed Qahtani to come and bless everyone with his mesmerizing words. The programme had more than 1200 registrations and more than 500 attendees. SAA TM Samyak Bajracharya started the meeting and handed the virtual floor to Division N Director TM Anish Dixit for a short introduction of the speaker who in reality needs no introduction.

From a child who stammered, did not have any friends or could barely talk to his cousins, Mohammed Qahtani started his journey as a social recluse. And sure enough, with his introverted nature and stammering challenge, speaking was not an easy feat for him to achieve. Whether it be the slap by the teacher for stammering while reading to the class, or being bullied with the nickname "Broken Radio" by the students of his school, Mohammed Qahtani started his journey with much more hurdles to overcome than many other speaking Champions have to. Listening to Mohammed Qahtani speak about his stammering issue being an obstacle for speaking, despite his yearning to be able to speak in front of the school, reminded me of "The King's Speech" where during the whole movie I kept on rooting for King George VI. And even as the listener to Mohammed Qahtani, I was rooting for him to keep on trying- losing myself in his words so much that for some moments I even forgot that he has already won the Championship as an accomplished speaker who did overcome his stammering issue.

Mohammed Qahtani went to the USA for his further studies, trying standup comedy for some time there. When he returned to Saudi Arabia, in 2009, he joined Toastmasters. But despite all of the speeches and standup comedy, in his first Table Topics, nervousness took the better of him and after 11 seconds, he was done. But hearing words of affirmation from a fellow person allowed him to keep on speaking and improving. This further prompted him to take part in contests. And during 2015, he won the World Championship of Public Speaking, and the rest is history.

"The journey to thousand miles starts with a single step." Not only do we have to iterate the same step a million times, but also be aware that doing so will take time. It is not going to happen in a matter of days, months or a year. Improvement is a gradual process and it will take years on end for a person to be able to accomplish their journey and fulfill their dreams. So, we need to have the



perseverance to keep on striving forward. Not just this, but we also need to understand that talent cannot beat hard work when talent doesn't work hard. During this process of working hard, we will stumble and fall numerous times. But it does not matter how many times we fall, but how many times we pull ourselves back up and keep on trying. Remember, talent will only last as long as you practice and keep on learning. To be able to accomplish this, we need to set targets for ourselves- targets which we can measure and which will keep us both motivated from making excuses and in check. These were some of the main takeaways for me from this programme.

Mohammed Qahtani also talked about believing in yourself and knowing that one day you will reach your goal, how we should always speak from our heart and how excuses are always going to lead to pitfalls. After the Question and Answer session with Mohammed Qahtani, where TM Ankit Goekna, Area N2 Director, was the moderator, TM Shraddha Joshi gave the concluding remarks for the programme.

Division N did a wonderful job with the whole programme's execution. I am pretty sure, similar to me, every attendee had important takeaways from the event and in retrospect, as they lay in bed and ruminate over the programme, is able to paint every step taken by Mohammed Qahtani in his Journey to the Championship.

finally see the completed jig-saw, it feels wonderful.


Now came the hard part - preparing the script. Where to start? What to share? How to express?
